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MALCOLM CHISHOLM MSP LAUNCHES "HAPPY TO TRANSLATE" LOGO

On 25 April, Minster for Communities Malcolm Chisholm (pictured right) launched the official "Happy to Translate" Logo at a special event held at The Hub in Edinburgh. Other special guests included Professor Geoff Palmer OBE and Selma Rahman. The event was very well attended by professionals and representatives from Scotland's many communities.

In his opening remarks Prof. Palmer highlighted some of the barriers the logo aims to overcome: "No communication...no information...no service." The logo will help overcome

language barriers so that people receive the information and services they need. Member organisations will display the logo to let people know they provide confidential translation and interpretation services.

The Associations – along with The City of Edinburgh Council, Lothian and Borders Police, The Moray Council, and NHS Lothian - are the first organisations to commit to piloting the Logo. It is hoped that over time, the Logo will be widely used by the public and private sector organisations in Scotland to promote a multi-cultural society.

Mr Chisholm said, "In order to build a Scotland that is fair and just we must ensure that everyone has equal access to our public services, information and resources. For this reason I am delighted to be supporting this new translation and interpreting logo which aims to break down the barriers faced by those who experience difficulty communicating in English."

The logo design was the result of a survey of BME communities (see article on page 2). The "Happy to Translate" Logo Initiative is grant funded by the Scottish Executive and Communities Scotland.


Aisha Nadeem brings commitment, skills and experience to the new post, which the Associations believe, will have considerable impact and deliver tangible results.

"HAPPY TO TRANSLATE" Logo Survey Report



The Associations will publish a report, "Development of the 'Happy to Translate' Logo: Findings and Outcomes of Consultation with Black and Minority Ethnic Communities in Scotland."

The publication will provides insight into the development of the official "Happy to Translate" Logo design, including the methodology of a 2004 consultation survey that asked people to vote for the design they liked best. Feedback given by the survey respondents provides insight into why the winning design (which received over 56% of votes) was so popular, and why the design was modified slightly in response to suggestions given.

Finally, the report analyses key data gathered from the 500 surveys completed by people from Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) communities. The data gives insight into the language needs of BME communities in Scotland according to specific

criteria such as age, gender, ethnicity and council area.

2nd JOB FAIR for BME Communities Held in Glasgow

Following its success in Edinburgh in 2004, the second annual Job Opportunities Fair for Black and Minority Ethnic Communities was held in Glasgow at the SECC on 11 June. The event was organised by Trust, Hanover (Scotland) & Bield Housing Associations in partnership with Scotlish Federation of Housing Associations (SFHA) and the Chartered Institute of Housing in Scotland (CIH Scotland).

Public sector employers joined together with some of Scotland's key housing organisations to offer recruitment and training opportunities to people from Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) communities living in and around Glasgow. It was a unique opportunity to get access to potential employers and discuss job opportunities and vacancies in a setting designed to ensure easy, one-to-one communication. For employers, the fair provided access to a wide variety of people whose skills and experience are often un-tapped. Free workshops on CV writing and interview techniques were also offered.

The event was supported by organisations such as Strathclyde Fire & Rescue, Glasgow Housing Association and Careers Scotland, amongst others.
