Easy Guide to Benefits for the 60+

Older people from Black and Minority Ethnic communities in Scotland will receive vital help to negotiate the benefits maze with the launch of a new Easy Guide to Benefits for the 60+.

The guide was developed jointly by the Trust, Hanover (Scotland) and Bield Housing Associations' Equal Opportunities programme and sponsored by Communities Scotland. It is the latest in a number of innovative projects jointly developed by the three Housing Associations and is part of a pioneering Pension Benefit Outreach Project.

Sarah Boyack, Labour MSP for Edinburgh Central (see photo), who launched the new auide the Scottish at Parliament, said: "A lot of older people don't take up the benefits they are entitled to. There are many barriers in their way from knowledge barriers to psychological

and physical. elderly are missing out, that's a tragedy. I want to congratulate Trust, Hanover and Bield on this initiative. It's a landmark getting this document published."

The guide has been published in six languages: Arabic, Bengali, Chinese (Cantonese), English, Hindi and Urdu.

Sarah Boyack congratulated the Housing Associations: "I think this will be one of the most important and tangible things you have done. The outreach project has already raised £400,000 in benefits for elderly people from the Black and Minority Ethnic communities. It has helped over 200 people. That's a real tangible benefit."

Pension Benefit Outreach Project

The Pension Benefit Outreach Project has completed its 18-month funding



period. In that time it has raised almost £400,000 in benefits for BME older people. Over 400 older people were assessed, over 200 people received extra benefits and many were put in touch with other services such as Care and Repair, Social Services and other service providers.

This project was not just about maximising income, but also bridging the information gap between BME older people and relevant service providers, as well as providing the knowledge and the basic tools to access other services available to them. Through the project many older people did not just benefit financially, but also grew in confidence (previously they were very reluctant, and even suspicious, about accessing any kind of services including benefits).

Sadly, the funding for this project has ended, but other sources are being pursued. Watch this space!

The 'Happy to Translate' Logo initiative continues to grow. In addition the original seven pilot organisations, five more have recently come on board:

These new organisations add to the diversity of the services and locations offered by the pilot organisations and means that more BME people will benefit from language assistance.

Job Opportunities Support Project

The aim of the Job Opportunities Support Project is to help improve access to job opportunities for Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) communities and overcome barriers to employment. It is funded by **Communities Scotland** and **Capital City Partnership**.

The Job Opportunities Development Officer, continues to work with community organisations, housing and public sector employers in Edinburgh and Lothians, and individuals requiring support and guidance in accessing job opportunities.



The completion of a few placements has proved very successful. Partnership work has also been developed with organisations offering similar services to offer specific support to individuals.

Visits to Housing Developments

Some Chinese service users from the Minority Ethnic Carers of Older People Project (MECOPP) visited the Associations' Sheltered, Very Sheltered and Care Housing developments in Edinburgh. The purpose of the visits was to inform Chinese older people of the variety of housing available from the three Housing Associations.



House Key Directory

The House Key directory is a new website and telephone helpline to help vulnerable people in Scotland live independently in their own homes. It was launched in January 2006 by the Scottish Executive and lists 7,000 housing supporting services that can benefit a variety of people, including:

- people with mental health problems
- refugees
- woman at risk of domestic abuse
- sensory impairment
- people with physical or people with learning difficulties

It also provides details of Housing Support available in Scotland, such as:

- the name of the service, where it is and who to contact
- what type of person the service is for
- current availability



Scottish Directory of Housing Support Services

• if accommodation based, a description of the facilities, whether it is suitable for those with mobility difficulties, and even if pets are allowed

The directory aims to provide enough detailed information to help service users make informed decisions, contact providers and apply for services. Additionally, it offers information to professionals, and to friends and relatives of people who require support. The telephone helpline has access to Language Line, and printed extracts from the website can be translated to another language on request.

The website library includes over 200 downloadable fact-sheets, guides and reports. A glossary provides straightforward explanations of terms that service users might come across.

All services have to be registered through the Care Commission and information on the website is updated on a regular basis. Some local authorities fund services through the Supporting People programme. People who require a service will need to have a financial assessment from their local authority to make sure they are eligible, organisations such as Sheltered Housing Associations will also assess an individual to make sure that the service is able to meet their needs.
